Whilst there will be areas impacted more deeply by poverty than others, there are pockets of poverty everywhere in Scotland. Scotland is a rich nation but unfortunately has unacceptably high levels of poverty.

Poverty must be a priority for every local authority and school – irrespective of where you live.

How can there be so much wealth but so much poverty?



Contextualising Child Poverty in Scotland

- Despite living in one of the wealthiest nations in the world – child poverty is of deep concern across the whole UK and Ireland.
- Child poverty levels are deepening. Poverty is a violation of children and young people's rights
- Scotland has a Child Poverty (Scotland) Act which places a legal responsibility upon the Scottish Government to significantly reduce child poverty.
- The first minister, John Swinney, has declared that eradicating child poverty is his number one priority.

Educational establishments and teachers alone will never resolve poverty, but we have an imperative role to play.



Rising Poverty Levels



ISP

Poverty levels were decreasing however over the past number of years these have been increasing in Scotland or remained 'stable'. The economic shocks of COVID and the cost-of-living crisis are ongoing.

How Much Child Poverty in Scotland?

- Over one million people in Scotland are living in poverty – a quarter of which are children.
- 260,000 children the equivalent of over 11,000 Scottish primary school classes - were trapped in relative poverty in Scotland in the last year.
- More than 1 in 4 children are living in poverty in Scotland. In more deprived areas this is at least 1 in 3.


- More than two-thirds of children in poverty live in working households.
- In the last year, 1 million children in Scotland experienced destitution.
- 20% of children experiencing poverty in Scotland a currently missing out in Scotland missing out on free school meals under current eligibility criteria.



Rising Poverty Levels

Figure 8: Children in poverty often live in households that lack food security

Levels of food security of all children and those in poverty after housing costs, Scotland 2020-23



Many families find themselves living in poverty following basic housing costs. Food insecurity is a significant problem in Scotland.

Many working families are turning to food banks or making tough decisions regularly to eat or heat their homes.

Proportion of children in relative poverty after housing cost, Scotland 2020-23





Share of children in relative poverty after housing costs who live in working households, Scotland




Work is not the route out of poverty for many people. Wages have stagnated. Many people are working multiple jobs to survive.


