

The Purpose of Anti-Racist Education

- Understand that 'race' is a social construct.
- Ensure every child feels valued as an individual in a learning environment that is safe and inclusive.
- Help everyone feel empowered to stand up to racism together.
- Improve relationships between children and young people.
- Create learning opportunities that balance British and European perspectives with global perspectives.
- Assist learners to become an ally and not a bystander and to become confident and active citizens for racial justice.

The Purpose of Anti-Racist Education

- Learning opportunities should challenge and address outdated and harmful stereotypes and misinformation.
- Reduce the development of prejudice and biases.
- Increase empathy and a sense of shared humanity.
- Support schools and settings to proactively prevent and address racism experienced by children, young people, staff, parents, carers and members of the wider community.
- Break the cycle of racial inequity.

Guiding Principles emerging from the Scottish Government's Anti-Racism in Education Programme (Curriculum Reform)

BREAKING THE MOULD:

Our Curriculum must be an Anti-Racist Curriculum.



Building Racial Literacy for Learners

- Foster a supportive and safe environment to have those vital discussions.
- Speak about Identity.
- Address and celebrate important events.
- Make the anti-racism approach a continual part of our curriculum.
- Ask questions and discuss children's views, curiosity and misconceptions.
- Acknowledge unfair behaviour in the classroom.

Pupil Voice

"When discussing racism through various subjects in schools, teachers should be aware of the resources they select. Some texts could be hurtful or for black students and students of colour and they may not feel comfortable sitting through this."

Anti-Racism across All Subjects

"We want to learn about the origins of mathematics in relation to Arabian history. We want to see various forms of art from across the world. We want to see Black people and People of Colour in books, videos and poems."

Confidence to talk about race

"School staff should have opportunities to develop their skills in navigating conversations about racism and racist incidents." "This would make us feel a lot safer and would make students more likely to report a racist incident instead of keeping it to themselves."

Impact of Racism: Race-Related Trauma from a teacher or staff perspective

What is Racial Trauma?

Racial trauma or race based traumatic stress, is the cumulative effects of racism on an individual's mental and physical health. It has been linked to feelings of anxiety, depression and suicidal thoughts, as well as other physical health issues.

Impact of Racism: Race-Related Trauma from a teacher or staff perspective

Microaggressions

"Everyday verbal, non-verbal and environmental slights, snubs or insults, whether intentional or unintentional, which communicate hostile, derogatory or negative messages to target persons based solely upon their marginalized group membership" (Sue et al 2019).
